

# What's it worth?

Face value is the postal value of the stamp. This will appear on the stamp.



The above stamp has a face value of 39p.

The dinosaur stamp has the face value equal to the current 1<sup>st</sup> class postage rate. Even though this stamp was bought when the 1<sup>st</sup> class postage was lower than it is today, the stamp can still be used for 1<sup>st</sup> class post.



This penny red **had** a face value of one old UK penny before decimalisation. Just because it is a penny red doesn't mean it will be very valuable today. There is a wide range of values for these stamps and it will depend on its condition, the margins at the sides and the letters at the bottom.

It takes an expert to calculate the value of stamps in a collection and most of the stamps won't be worth very much. Some reasons that can make the stamp valuable are:

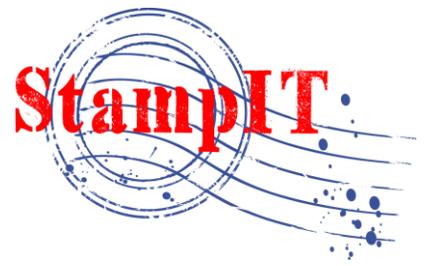
- it is very rare;
- has an error (a mistake that was made when it was printed);
- it has a rare postmark or cancellation on it.

The best advice is to collect because you like the stamps and not because you think they will be valuable one day!

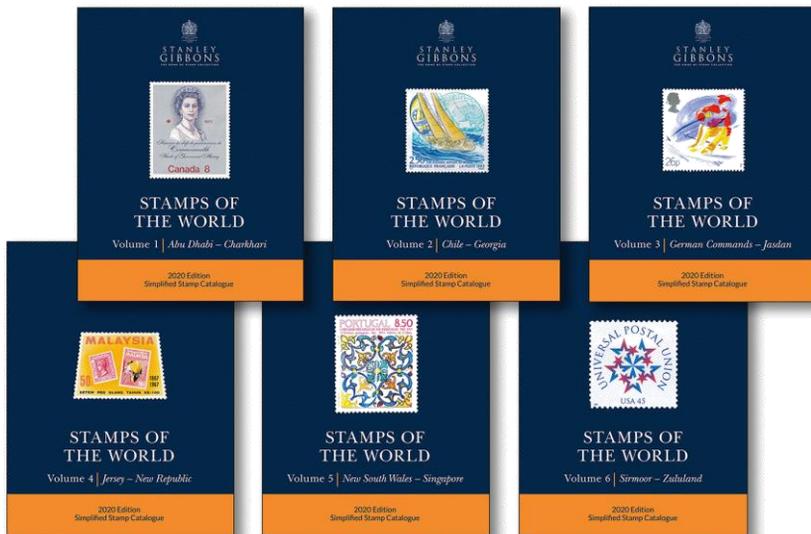


# Catalogues

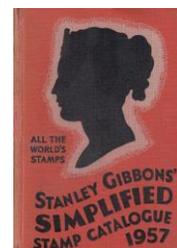
First of all, don't get too excited if you look up a stamp in a catalogue and there is a high value beside it. The catalogue value is usually much more than you will be able to sell it for and the stamp would have to be in excellent condition.

Catalogues do give you an idea of the value but they are much more useful to find out information about the stamp. For example, the year it was issued, the reason it was issued, the other stamps that are in the set.

There are catalogues for countries and some for popular themes as well as catalogues for all world stamps. There are so many stamps today that the latest world catalogues from Stanley Gibbons, the world's oldest company to produce stamp catalogues, have to be in 6 large volumes!

Stanley Gibbons produced the first stamp catalogue in 1865. It was a penny price list and it continued until 1879.

# How to look up a catalogue

For this example, we are going to find out more about this stamp.

If you know the year the stamp was issued it is easier to find the stamp in a printed catalogue. If you don't know the year, online catalogues can help. Read StampIT's language leaflets on 'The Story of a Stamp' to find out more about how to investigate a stamp.



This stamp has the year it was issued on it. You need a magnifying glass to see it.

Look up 1991 in the catalogue and find the picture of the stamp.

- This particular stamp celebrates the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of Charles Babbage (which means he was born in 1791).
- He was a computer science pioneer (the first to explore the possibility of a digital machine which could be programmed).

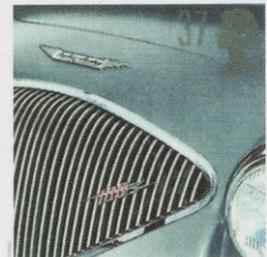
